


A Blue Mountains multi day walk

on Gundungurra Country

Blue Mountains valleys, villages and waterfalls: this two day walk will take you on a journey along the escarpment high above the **Jamison Valley**, in World Heritage-listed Blue Mountains National Park and through scenic Blue Mountains City Council locations.

Experience superb views towards Mount Solitary and the Three Sisters as you traverse exhilarating cliff-edge tracks with villages to explore along the way.

Starting in Wentworth Falls and travelling through Leura to Katoomba, you will tread historic heritage walking tracks as you explore lookouts, waterfalls, rainforest and flora and fauna. Highlights include the Three Sisters Aboriginal Place, Wentworth Falls waterfall, hand-built historic and restored sandstone tracks and lookouts, sightings of lyrebirds and yellowtailed black cockatoos, and unique villages with cafés, restaurants and accommodation.



Day One Wilson Park, Wentworth Falls to Gordon Falls, Leura



Grade 3: Medium

Distance: 11km Time: 5-7 hours one way

Start your walk at Wilson Park picnic area in Wentworth Falls, not far from the train station.

Follow in the footsteps of Charles Darwin as you take Darwins Walk following pretty Jamison Creek south to reach lookouts over the magnificent Wentworth Falls waterfall.

From here you will follow the Overcliff-Undercliff track past many spectacular lookouts, winding your way above and below the cliff line towards Leura.

Take a short detour up to the Conservation Hut café or continue on over Lilians Bridge and past the Fairmont Resort, where you can stop for lunch at the café or one of the restaurants.

From here walk through pretty Leura to rejoin the walking track at Willoughby Road. Be careful of traffic through this section as the footpath is narrow, stay clear of the road.

Once back on the track you will catch your first glimpse of the Three Sisters and Mount Solitary as you wander along the cliff top, then down through Pool of Siloam and up to Gordon Falls picnic area.

Day Two Gordon Falls, Leura to Scenic World, Katoomba



Grade 3: Medium

Distance: 8km Time: 4-5 hours one way

Start day two at Gordon Falls picnic area. Make sure you take the short detour down to Gordon Falls lookout for a stunning view across the Jamison Valley with Gordon Falls falling to the east.

From here you'll make your way along the cliff-edge tracks. The view and many waterfalls such as Leura Cascades provide some rest stops along the way.

The highlight is the Three Sisters Aboriginal Place, the famous view of the Three Sisters, which are sacred to the Aboriginal people of this location.

The track continues along Prince Henry Cliff Walk to end at Scenic World, where you can celebrate with a drink at the Terrace Bar.



As you walk, listen for the call of the yellow-tailed black cockatoo (Wumbarrung in Gundungurra language). The Wumbarrung has special significance to Gundungurra traditional

custodians, and its flight reflects the moods and seasons of Gundungurra Country. It's also the wayfinding icon for Grand Cliff Top Walk.

Additional information

- Grand Cliff Top Walk is accessible from a number of locations so you can tailor the length of your walk.
- Enjoy a night in a mountain village. Choose from many stays and food options and complete the track the following day.
- Buses and taxis are available from Gordon Falls, Katoomba Kiosk and Scenic World to take you to your accommodation for the night.
- Two days are suggested but why not stay longer and explore additional side walks and the unique villages?
- Grand Cliff Top Walk is the first substantial new walking track in the Blue Mountains in more than 70 years.
- Blue Mountains National Park is NSW's most visited national park, with around 8 million visits per year.
